Letter to the Editor

The campaign, headed by the US Department of Homeland Security (www.dhs.gov/dhspublic/), is aimed at making citizen preparedness "a priority for every city, every neighborhood and

every home" in the US. In addition, ARRL encourages all Amateur Radio operators to have a family emergency communication plan in place in case of an emergency, such as a severe weather event.




