We've learned the FCC's Report & Order that abolishes testing on Morse code for Amateur Radio licensing will probably (no guarantee, yet) become effective Friday, February 23. This would be the first day new General and Extra class licenses can be earned without needing to pass the 5 wpm Morse code test. Whether one likes or hates the idea, code testing will no longer be required.

We can make of this what we

choose. We can take the attitude this marks the pending death of Amateur Radio or we can look upon it as the best opportunity Amateur Radio has had in decades for regaining its health and growth. It is up to you . . . and to no one else. If we choose to take the first attitude, you will be right. Amateur Radio's pending doom is on the horizon. You will make this happen. ## Hamfest 2007

Well it's that time of year again to start thinking about the hamfest. Over the last few months I have been contacting different places asking about prices for August 19, 2007. I narrowed it down to two places. The Trumbull County Fair Grounds offered us the best prices so far. Keep in mind that electric, water and the parking lots around them are included in all of these prices. For the banquet hall (2,160 sq ft) including the kitchen and restrooms for \$500 a day; commercial building (12,000 sq ft) including the rest rooms for \$400 a day; agricultural building (2,720 sq ft) no restrooms for \$100 a day; lower grand stands including the restrooms and the kitchen for \$250 a day; and the grounds from east block to gate A for \$750 a day and the restrooms are an extra \$250 a day. I have also looked into the Holiday Inn Metroplex in liberty. They have offered us 7,000 sq ft for

\$1,000 a day up to 14,000 sq ft for \$2,000 a day. These prices include the restrooms and the entire parking lot.

After meeting with all the places I have decided to draw up a contract with the Fair Grounds. We are going to rent the commercial building (12,000 sq ft) for the hamfest. This building accommodates approximately 200-250 vendors giving them each a ten foot space. With the recent hamfests declining, I would like to cut some of our costs for this year. On January 23, 2007 there was a hamfest meeting. Those who attending were presented with a power point presentation about some of the things that I expect to do this year for Hamfest. We are also planning some really great fundraisers for this year to help fund Hamfest. For those who did not attend or want to attend the next meeting, it will be at Arby's in Champion on

February 13, 2007 at 7:00pm.

On a side note, I would like to thank a few people for the success of last year's hamfest. First of all I would like to thank everyone who worked the hamfest and/or helped out in some way. And most of all I would like to thank the fundraising committee, your suggestions helped put on a great hamfest. I looked into all of them except for four. They worked great and I hope to use all of them this year. scale home in Manhattan. Elaine Wheeler, whose insomnia often found her wandering the house at odd hours, swore she saw a dead body across the way from the home through the parlor window.

Molly Galano, who played Elaine Wheeler, was extremely convinc-

ing as the troubled insomniac. She radiated fear and stress as Elaine tried to convince the police and everyone around her that she indeed had seen not only one dead man in a wing chair, but later a woman. She reacted to cues around her in a manner which the others in her life be-

lieved came from the betrayal and death of her first husband and his mistress. In the period of three days, Elaine deteriorated to the point that her husband and the others around her felt she had finally needed hospitalization for the first time in seven years. Her husband, John Wheeler, played by Alan Purdum, was in turns supportive, worried, harried, and angry. His own secret, a hidden affair with Elaine's former psychiatric nurse and friend Blanche Cook, makes him a possible suspect in the murder, especially since the building next door is owned by a company he and Elaine own. And Blanche, played by Terri Gilbert, seemed to be playing into all of Elaine's fears and anxieties from her past, the very things that had hospitalized her originally. The only person in the household who remained faithful to Elaine was her maid Helga, played by Kathy Purdum.

Of course, a murder brings out the police and the neighbors. Officer Vanelli, played by Chuck Jones, and Lieutenant Walker, played by Tim McGinley, were an interesting pair. Lieutenant Walker's insistence that nothing had happened and how he went from trying to placate Elaine to doing everything he could to avoid her constant nagging was believable. Curtis Appleby, played by Tom Jones, was indeed the scene stealer. The community busybody with his own gossip rag and his nose into everyone's business, he had a chip on his shoulder because he'd tried to buy the house

the Wheelers lived in and been outbid. So at first glance, he could have been the one trying to drive them out with the body in the window. Dr. Tracy Lake, played by Jeria Brown, didn't seem so sure she herself hadn't seen something out the window either. And the highly irritated old shopkeeper Hoke, played by Sherman Davidson, just wanted things to die down so he could sell the worst potato salad in the world...

Considering the cast had to compete with the general noise and disorder of SCOPE night, I was pleasantly surprised that no one seemed to be distracted. Cast members projected well, and the delivery of lines was generally smooth, with only one noticeable mistake. Molly Galano was incredible, one would think she was about to have a nervous breakdown right in front of your eyes, while Alan Purdum seemed to summon up all the patience and irritation within him to work his way through the varying emotional climate. Terri Gilbert put together the perfect back stabbing best friend and Kathy Purdum played the all knowing maid with a lot of skill. Unfortunately, the accent she used drove me up a Northeast Ohio peppered wall.

with varying German inflections made for a lot of inconsistency. When it came to the police, Tim McGinley was the typical, harried cop with too much to do, irritated and angry that his time was being wasted. But for Chuck Jones, his Vanelli seemed to blend into the woodwork a bit. I can't understand it, but it leads me to wonder how the character was written. And Jeria Brown really did well once she started to relax and get into the scene. At first glance, she seemed very stiff and Sherman Davidson's formal. abrupt entrance into the scene truly made me laugh. He was part temper tantrum and I was a bit concerned about where the flashlight was going. Tom Jones had probably the most entertaining character in the whole production. He was a bit unpredictable, and seemed to really enjoy what he was doing. Appleby was hilarious! They all made this gaslight adventure and it's twist ending a genuinely enjoyable production.
