Club Team Work

Field Day 2003 looked to be a great success for the Warren Amateur Radio Association. I do not know what the final numbers for contacts were, but I am sure that Tom Roscoe / K8CX will be giving us an update as soon as it is available. We were able to operate as an "8A" club station with the members who attended and radios that we were able to setup. We also had a number of "out of town" visitors who stopped by as they heard the announcement on the W8VTD repeater (Thanks Dave--KZ8T).

We started some setup on Friday, June 27th with the successful movement of my trailer to the site. The task was aided by Karl Gerlt / KF8MG and Dale Bowen / W8SHR. And we did not get stuck!

The main Field Day setup started out early Saturday morning and ran right up to the starting time of 14:00 hrs EST. Some of the highlights of the setup were a 10-meter and 6-meter station, both with beams on a rotor, a 2-meter SSB station, and with the help of bow and arrow we setup a 10-meter through 80-meter dipole. We also built a Satellite 2-meter up / 70cm down array from the ground up, more about that later. This list does not include the impressive

antenna array already attached to Dale's shack ready to use.

One of my highlights of Field Day was the team effort of the Club's members who helped me with a project to build an automatic Satellite tracking antenna array. This was real Club teamwork and what Field Day is all about. Many thanks to all of you who assisted me with the project, especially our visitor from England who saved me from placing a clamp backwards. Through members working together we found the elusive rotor terminal numbers, learned which way was truly "up", and had a successful "smoke test".

It is working together as a Club with a common goal of a successful Field Day, that makes it all worthwhile. So if you were unable to attend this year's WARA Field Day, be sure to make plans for next year. There is plenty to do, and lots of opportunity to work on your operating skills, as well as learn some new radio skills. Remember the goal of Field Day, (besides having fun) is to practice preparing for Emergency Communications should the need arise. And I was proud about how our

The day will start with the main EchoLink net servers opening at 6:00 AM EST and the directed net to begin that evening at 7:00PM EST. All EchoLink, IRLP and eQSO servers are

invited to join at the times of their own choosing during the day to actively participate or just listen, but should plan to link no later than 7PM EST. Further instructions regarding how to link to the net will be forthcoming here on the EchoLink News Group before 9/11.

Last year's 9/11 net is still being talked about as being, without a doubt, the largest real-time gathering of amateur radio operators ever, and the organizers of this year's net are planning the 2003 net to be even bigger and better. The first net was so large that it strained the capacity of the EchoLink servers to handle the 1000+ stations that participated. This year, the improved "The Bridge" conference software will allow the 9/11 net to have virtually unlimited capacity. Ask your server operator / owner if he plans to link to the 9/11 net.

Ohio qso party

The Ohio Bicentennial running of the Ohio QSO Party will be Saturday,

August 23, 2003. It runs from noon to midnight, local time. Activity will be on the low bands, 10 through 80 meters, CW and sideband.

Stations inside of Ohio can work anyone in the contest. Stations outside Of Ohio (anywhere in the world, and yes, we do get entrants from Europe most years) can only work stations in Ohio -- so we buckeyes are the hunted, not the hunters for a change!

There are numerous awards (certificates and plaques) available – including >a club competition (club members compete for both individual and club awards).

We plan to activate all 88 counties, many with fixed stations, and many, if not all, with mobile operations. There should be plenty of activity for all 12 hours. Operate for a short time or the whole contest period – whatever suits your time budget.

Technical achievement may be demonstrated through activities such as publications, research and development, creativity in hardware I, software I firmware systems design and implementation, technical instruction, application of advanced technology to public service communications.

Morse code and me

For those of you who don't know it, the latest World Radio Conference decided to eliminate the requirement that hams have some proficiency in Morse to operate on the HF bands (that's 30 MHz and down for those whose experience is limited to 2 meters). As a result, two countries, the U.K. and Switzerland, have eliminated the need to pass a CW exam, and pundits predict that many more will follow. The FCC is unlikely to act on its own, but has already been petitioned by the National Conference of VECs to eliminate the Morse requirement (go to www.qrz.com for info). I guess I've seen it coming for years now, and I guess that soon no one will need to learn the beautiful rhythmic sounds of CW. I signed onto Echolink tonight, and expect to be able to talk to my friends in Australia by that mode soon. That'll be nice! It'll be like using the telephone, without the bills. I'll be able to keep up with them, their kids, and now even their grandkids. It'll be easy. But, it won't hold a candle to the first time I talked to a guy from Australia. That was at about 3.00 AM on 40 meters about 43 years ago. The man's call was VK3XB, Ivor Stafford from Box Morse code and me (cont. . .)

Hill in the Aussie state of Victoria. I'd read that he was trying to get WAS by

working novices, so I stayed up late to see if I could hear him. I did, on the 40 meter novice band with my little National receiver. I called him with my Heathkit DX40 transmitter and when I heard my call in his slow morse just above the noise level, it was one of the most unbelievable thrills I've ever had. I'll never forget it! I met Ivor 20 years later when I lived in VK-land, and he showed me his logbook with my call in it. Neat! Many hams can relate to a story like this about a first DX contact. But, I wonder if such stories will be a thing of the past, what new hams will be telling their kids in the future.

Yeah, it'll be great to use Echolink to hook up with old friends down under, and, yeah, I know that in another ten or

about the past to my old friends using whatever the latest upgrade to Echolink is. But, I'll be thinking about what we've lost. And the saddest thing of all is that those who scream so loudly to get rid of the morse requirement, who want to make all communications so much easier, so much clearer, to remove the QRN (that's static gang!), won't have a clue what they're missing. Sometimes when things are changing, you need to take a good look at what you're giving up with the change. It's very easy to throw the baby out with the dirty bath water without even knowing it. Then, when the house is quiet and dull, it's too late to wonder where the baby went!

twenty years (and I hope to still be around then!) Morse will probably not be used by hams anymore. But, ya know what, when that happens I think I'll just sell my rig and spend my time talking
