Repeater news

It's been awhile since I have written. The link transmitter for Newton Falls stopped working a few weeks ago. It has been operating from the Exciter for the last few weeks. Sometimes it was not full quiet back to the main site. I made a back today and installed our spare final amplifier. Surprise, it did not work! I then went through an alignment procedure for the exciter (The two plus the oscillator comprise the transmitter) and the final came alive. I believe the level of drive was not high enough to drive the power amplifier. I don't know for sure because I did not notice the point it came up. However I believe one of the air variable capacitors was setting on a dirty spot. I had output but, on the hundred watt scale one of communication service monitor it is hard to tell the difference between 100 milliwatts and 200 hundred. This should mean the spare is still good. This is good because the only source I see these days is Ebay and they are bringing more than I think they are worth.

If any one happens on a source of UHF GE Master II's we may be interested.

I would like to talk about the controller identifier (ID) in my operating tips. For

the most part most of the ID timers are as they came from the factory. The manufacturer calls the technique "Smart ID'er". Smart in that it tries to ID at least every ten minutes without interfering with communications.

The first ID is the initial ID. This is sent when the repeater has been inactive for ten minutes. The repeater will send this when the initial transmission ends. unless this transmission exceeds fifteen seconds. If this transmission exceeds fifteen seconds the "forced ID" is sent. Forced ID is CW at twenty words per minute. Our forced ID is low enough in tone and volume as not to cover voice communications but still can be copied.

After the repeater has been in use for six minutes the controller starts looking for a chance to ID without interfering with communications. It will do so by sending one of the three "Rotating ID's." To do this it will wait for the repeater to be allowed to drop. After the four second "tail timer" times out. controller will send the ID then drop the transmitter.

After the repeater has been in use for eight minutes without an ID the controller will start trying to send an "Anxious ID." This is a voice ID containing only the repeater call sign.

Finally after nine and a half minutes with no repeater ID the controller will send an "Forced ID." This ID can come over a user station if necessary.

If a voice ID of any type comes on a user can interrupt the ID by transmitting over it. The controller will immediately change to a "Forced ID."

My operating point is that many people feel they should let the repeater

drop between users' transmissions allowing time for breakers. An admirable operating policy. However keep in mind if you do this the controller will try to ID with a "Rotating ID" every six minutes. Causing an even further delay before vou can transmit.

Another thought might be this. The purpose of the "Courtesy Tone" was originally to allow time for breakers to enter a QSO. Preventing repeater users from "quick keying." If you accept this idea then a second or two after the courtesy tone is enough time for possible breakers to get in.

Keep in mind if you wish to enter an existing QSO on a repeater with a three or more second tail timer you must break as soon as one station unkeys. Waiting for the repeater to drop will result in a long wait. Most repeaters still seem to have at least a three second tail timer plus a one second courtesy tone. 73.

FCC Poised to Act on BPL Report and Order in Mid-October (Sep 24, 2004) -- The FCC Office of Engineering and Technology (OET) will present a broadband over power line (BPL) Report and Order to the full Commission when it meets October 14, the ARRL has learned. More than 6100 comments have been filed on the topic since the FCC released its initial Notice of Inquiry in the proceeding, ET Docket 03-104, in April 2003 and a subsequent Notice of Proposed Rule Making (NPRM), ET Docket 04-37, in February of this year.

Amateur Radio Emergency Communications Course registration (Oct 1, 2004) -- Registration for the ARRL Amateur Radio Emergency Communications Level I on-line course (EC-001) opens Monday, October 4, 1201 AM EDT, and will remain open through the October 9-10 weekend or until all available seats have been filled. Class begins Friday, October 22. Radio amateurs over age 55 are strongly encouraged to participate. Thanks to our grant sponsors--the Corporation for National and Community Service and the United Technologies Corporation-the \$45 registration fee paid upon enrollment will be reimbursed after successful completion of the course.
